

BOAT WASH STATION

Phase 1 - Frequently Asked Questions



1

Michel has a non-motorized boat on Hélène Lake. He wonders if he should wash his boat even though it has always remained on this lake.

Michel must go to Town Hall or to the boat wash station during business hours. The Municipality will ask him to fill out an access permit form to obtain a sticker for Hélène Lake.

Chrystel owns a rental cottage. His guests want to bring their own non-motorized boats. Is this allowed?

Owners are responsible for boats launched from their property. Guests are admitted, but they must go to the Boat Wash Station to clean their boat. A washing certificate will then be issued to authorize access to the requested body of water. Guests must have their proof on them at all times. Fees are free for non-motorized boats.

Daniel has two non-motorized boats on Rainbow Lake and one motorized boat on Lake Louisa. How does it work?

Daniel will have to make two different requests. He will have to obtain an access permit for his non-motorized boats and an access permit for his motorized boat to Lake Louisa. He must obtain a sticker indicating that he has his access permit, for each body of water.

Deborah has an inflatable paddle board. She is leaving on vacation and wants to take her paddle board to another lake. Is it possible?

Yes totally. Before leaving, she must clean her paddle boat at the Boat Wash Station. On its return, she will have to return to the Boat Wash Station, because the washing certificate and the access permit cease to be valid as soon as the paddle board leaves the body of water for which it was authorized.
